During his official visit to the Department of Texas for its convention, American Legion National Commander James LaCoursiere Jr. was asked if he wanted to tour Kerr County, which on July 4 experienced massive and sudden flooding that has so far left 134 people dead and more than 100 still missing.

LaCoursiere immediately said yes, and he, American Legion Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission Director Cole Lyle and Texas Legionnaires took the more than two-hour drive to Kerrville to see firsthand the devastation – and the work being done on the ground by American Legion Family members.

Since shortly after the flooding occurred, <u>American</u> <u>Legion Post 208 in Kerrville has been serving as a relief center</u> for first responders and others there performing rescue and recovery missions.

"That was very heart-warming to see, how The American Legion Family stepped up and really took control of the situation in their area," LaCoursiere said. "It's like a command center for the communities. And adjacent to their property is where

FEMA is set up. And to see the Legion Family embraced by the community is fantastic."

But seeing the efforts of Post 208 – as well as the support for the post's effort coming from throughout the Department of Texas and other stations nationwide – wasn't a surprise to LaCoursiere. He said he's seen similar efforts as he's toured the country and seen the results of natural disasters, from hurricane damage in Florida and North Carolina, to other weather-related damage in Georgia, Tennessee and West Virginia.

"I'm going on my 31st year with the Legion, and it does not surprise me how the Legion Family steps up and takes a very proactive role," he said. "We've seen that all year in all of the areas we've gone into, with the Legion Family stepping up. These posts that have stepped up, you can see that they are an integral part of the community. And when you speak with the leadership in the community, they make you fully aware of that: how The American Legion is always there for them, and not just in times of disaster."

Though it wasn't the first time he's toured an area impacted by storm devastation, each time remains equally jarring. "It's heart-breaking when you see some of the scenes that you see when you're right there on the ground," LaCoursiere said. "You see a lot of things that you don't see on the media. The true destruction. You still see them out there during the recovery efforts.

"It makes you think twice about what Mother Nature is capable of doing. It's hard to talk about. You get some of those emotional stories when you speak to people in the community. They lost their homes. They've lost vehicles. They can't find their pets. Things like that. But they're right there holding each other up."

Serving Communities and Building Champions: The American Legion Auxiliary of Massachusetts and American Legion Softball

The American Legion Auxiliary Department of Massachusetts has long stood as a pillar of service, patriotism, and community support across the Commonwealth. The Auxiliary: Service with Purpose

Founded in 1919 alongside The American Legion, the Auxiliary provides vital support to veterans, their families, and local communities. In Massachusetts, the Department's units carry out projects ranging from veterans' hospital volunteering and scholarship fundraising to organizing local events that promote Americanism and civic engagement. Members work hand in hand with Legionnaires while also leading their own initiatives tailored to women's leadership, youth mentorship, and community resilience.

Each year, the Department of Massachusetts sponsors scholarships, coordinates Girls State sessions to teach government leadership, and partners with schools, shelters, and hospitals to extend help where it's needed most. Their work may be quiet at times, but its effects are lasting.

American Legion Softball: More Than a Game

While baseball has long been a flagship American Legion sport, softball is gaining ground as an equally powerful platform for developing character, teamwork, and leadership in young women. American Legion Softball gives high school-aged girls a chance to compete at a high level while representing their hometowns and embodying the values of the Legion: duty, honor, discipline, and sportsmanship.

In Massachusetts, Legion-sponsored softball programs are helping fill a crucial gap in youth sports by offering affordable, organized play in the summer months. Many teams are supported not only by local American Legion posts but also by Auxiliary units that provide fundraising, logistical help, and moral support. This collaboration ensures more girls can access the field, compete with pride, and build the confidence that carries beyond the diamond.

A Shared Mission

What ties the Auxiliary's civic mission and American Legion Softball together is a shared belief in investing in future generations. Whether it's by volunteering in a VA hospital or cheering from the bleachers at a softball game, the members of the American Legion family are committed to shaping stronger, more connected communities.

As the Department of Massachusetts looks ahead, expanding support for youth sports and increasing community engagement remain key priorities. The Auxiliary, with its strong legacy and committed members, is leading by example—demonstrating that service, like sport, is all about showing up, working hard, and lifting others up.

Aug/1919 - the American Legion has its charter headed to Congress (Chartered in Sept.); 8/9/21 The Legion's efforts result in creation of the US Veterans Bureau, forerunner of the VA; **8/22/41** The U.S. Navy commissions the USS American Legion and her World War II career begins, including landing some of the first troops at Guadalcanal, supplying a hospital, conducting rescue missions and training exercises; **8/9/46** The American Legion Boys Forum of National Government, later renamed American Legion Boys Nation, is conducted for the first time at American University in Washington, D.C.; 8/20/50 A new American Legion National Headquarters building is dedicated in Indianapolis. The 100,000-squarefoot \$2.5 million structure greatly expands capacity for the nation's largest veterans organization, on State of Indiana property known as "American Legion Mall"; 8/14/51 A new seven-story American Legion National Headquarters building in Washington D.C. is dedicated by President Harry Truman; 8/24/69 The Legion's National Executive Committee establishes the National Emergency Fund as a result of the effects of Hurricane Camille; 8/26/82 The Legion presents a \$1 million check to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund for construction of the Wall in Washington, becoming the largest single contributor to the project; 8/32/89 In just 60 days, The American Legion completes the

collection of more than 1 million signatures on a petition supporting a constitutional amendment to protect the U.S. flag from deliberate acts of desecration, in the aftermath of a Supreme Court decision ruling that such acts are protected under the First Amendment; 8/2/90 The Legion files suit against the federal government for failure to conduct a Congress-mandated study about the effects of Agent Orange on veterans who served in Vietnam; 8/24/94

The Legion announces the creation of the Citizens Flag Alliance, a coalition of organizations and individual citizens united to work for a constitutional amendment to protect the U.S. flag from physical desecration; 8/28-30/01 The American Legion passes a resolution to rekindle Blue Star Service Banner program; Aug/05 Delegates at the 87th National Convention in Honolulu unanimously voice their support for the global war on terrorism with Resolution 169; Aug/11 The American Legion Baseball World Series is held for the first time in the tournament's new permanent home, Shelby, N.C. Prior to this, the tournament had rotated to different cities. Total paid attendance at the Shelby contests soars to an all-time high of 86,000 total; **9/30/13** National Commander James E. Koutz announces that the American Legion family raised more than \$1.1 million for Operation Comfort Warriors during the 2012-2013 fundraising year, surpassing the original goal by over \$500,000; 9/16/17 The Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational

Assistance Act of 2017 – also known as the "Forever GI Bill" because it removes time limits for veterans who wish to use it for college - is signed into law by President Donald J. Trump. The legislation is named for The American Legion past national commander who in the winter of 1943-44 drafted the Servicemen's Readjustment Act that changed the nation after World War II; 8/23/17 President Donald J. Trump signs the Veterans Appeals and Modernization Act of 2017 onstage at the 99th American Legion National Convention, in Reno, Nev; 8/24/17 Denise H. Rohan of Wisconsin is elected national commander, the first woman to hold the role in the Legion's history; 8/4/20 American Legion National Commander James W. "Bill" Oxford launches the 100 Miles of Hope challenge that asks registrants to walk, run, bicycle, ride, paddle, swim or transport themselves however they like 100 miles by Veterans Day 2020, 100 days away; 8/10/22 President Joe Biden signs into law the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxins Act, a historic move strongly supported and promoted by The American Legion, to provide health-care service and disability compensation to some 4 million additional veterans, mostly post-9/11, who were exposed to toxic contamination in the military.

Creating Solid Footing for the Future

We are reminded to train our replacement, who's going to be the Junior-Vice Commander, or Finance Officer, maybe a new Sgt-at-Arms. So what's training, "Here's the new Post Officers Guide, let me know if you have any questions." Though it may be considered training, is it truly effective? To some degree. Maybe send the newly appointed officer to a District or Department training seminar. Great! Not only effective training, but also they start developing or enlarging a network to help answer questions.

We are well on our way to creating a strong Post Officer. Add a dash of MENTORING and you're more apt to have a better trained and more effective individual.

Mentoring is a protected relationship which supports learning and experimentation and helps individuals develop their potential.

The purpose of mentoring is to facilitate the personal and professional growth of individuals by providing guidance, support, and knowledge transfer from experienced mentors to mentees.

With new people filling officer positions, mentoring is extremely important. All to often, we have individuals taking a post position under duress, they get "talked into" a position they don't really understand. The Post leadership should make every effort to provide that person with a mentor. And no one said you couldn't have a assistant "" or "". Maybe you didn't have time to train your replacement, such as the Post Finance Officer passed away, or the Sr Vice quit because of a personal issue. Sound familiar? And again, training is provided, but you really need to also provide a mentor. The mentor, though sage, does not need to be a subject matter specialist (ie: financial back ground), but it certainly helps. An effective mentor needs to be a good listener and supporter, and answer questions, regardless how mundane. In a nutshell, do not hover, be overbearing, etc.. Be a good solid constructive supporter, pass on the info for the member to succeed. Match up mentors with mentees that will enrich the Post, it's worth the investment.










Softball State Champions Webster Dudley Post 184

IMPROVING ACCESS TO COMMUNITY CARE

Legislative Point Paper

PROBLEM:

- Access to community care is essential for veterans, particularly those living in rural areas. An estimated 5 million veterans reside in rural communities, with approximately 58% of them enrolled in VA healthcare compared to 41% of urban veterans, underscoring the need for accessible healthcare options.
- VA's community care costs have risen dramatically since the passage of the MISSION Act, with over \$150 billion spent on community care providers since 2015.
- Community care providers are struggling to meet training requirements and established VA policy when prescribing potentially harmful medications like opioids and benzodiazepines.
- Billing and reimbursement have historically been pain points for community care. Delays in payment to community providers discourage partnerships with the VA.

KEY POINTS:

- Rural veterans depend on VA healthcare more than other veterans, and struggle with access to specialty care as well as transportation to routine and specialty care.
- The VA's community care costs have risen dramatically since the passage of the Mission Act.
- Community care providers are struggling to meet training requirements and established VA policy when prescribing potentially harmful medications like opioids and benzodiazepines.

WHAT CONGRESS CAN DO:

- Hold the Office of Community Care accountable for the continuity of veteran care by increasing oversight to ensure training requirements are met and guidelines for prescribing potentially dangerous drugs followed appropriately.
- 2. Improve communication and transparency between VA providers, CCN providers, and veterans.
- 3. Pass S. 275/ HR. 740, the ACCESS Act, co-led by Senator Moran and Representative Bost.



Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth meets with the senators

Wednesday's American Legion Boys Nation schedule included the longest scheduled offsite visits, with the senators spending more than nine hours at various stops in the Arlington area.

The bulk of that time was spent at the Pentagon, where the senators were given a tour of the second-largest office building in the world and the headquarters for the U.S. Department of Defense.

Toward the end of the tour, all of the senators took their seats in the Hall of Heroes, a room dedicated to honoring Medal of Honor recipients. And at a little after 4 p.m. they delivered a collective gasp when they realized who had walked into the room: Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth.

None of the senators had been given any clue that their guest speaker would be the man in charge of the Department of Defense. Hegseth spoke for around 15 minutes and then spent the next 30 minutes being peppered with questions from the senators before receiving a standing ovation from his audience that was similar to his reception when he entered the room.

"I want you to know how motivating it is to us to see this kind of enthusiasm and commitment to serve," Hegseth told the senators. "While we're in the business here in the Pentagon of wearing uniforms and making sure we're as strong and ready as possible to defend the United States of America, I know ... the precursor to that job is ensuring we have young people who understand what a special country we live in. The United States of America is the exception to the rule in human history."

A member of American Legion Post 225 in Forest Lake, Minn., since 2005, Hegseth said the United States provides opportunities for its citizens not seen in other nations.

"Most men and women who've grown up, grew up under autocrats or kings or dictators or commandand-control economies didn't grow up with the kind of opportunities and freedom that we have in this country, where anybody from any background, regardless of where you grow up, it doesn't matter," he said. "You have an opportunity in America to achieve the American dream and succeed."

Hegseth said he hoped members of this year's Boys Nation would consider a career in service to others, which includes the military. "I'm a little biased in believing that military service is a pretty damn good route to go," he said. "It is about the purest manifestation of selflessness, of testing yourself and of giving back to your country. I hope you'll think about the Army, the Air Force, the Marine Corps, the Space Force, or the Navy, any one of them. They're all fantastic."


Hegseth said the senators in the room will have an important role to play in the nation's future.

"One of the missions I've appreciated of the American Legion for a long time is the mission of Americanism, of love of God and country, of fostering that spirit amongst the next generation," he said. "I'm looking out at an incredible group of young men here who have a chance to be a part of shaping that next generation.

"Thank you for taking the time to come to Washington and learn about our incredible country that is still leading the way for the world. And it's going to be your job when I'm long gone to continue to lead the way for us and keep us good and free and strong."

The tour prior to the time with Hegseth took each of the four Boys Nation sections along different routes that shared areas dedicated to all five branches of the federal armed forces. During its tour, the Jefferson Section was able to briefly meet with the highest-ranked enlisted servicemember in the U.S. military: David Isom, a former Navy SEAL and Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Isom spent a few minutes chatting with the senators about the Boys Nation program and then took a picture with the group.





- Access to CHAMPVA (health care coverage for eligible caregivers)




